Subject Title: Action to approve the conceptual landscape design and design theme "Carson City's History in Motion" for three interchanges and three grade separations on Phase 1 (northern leg) of the Carson City Freeway. (Vern L. Krahn, Park Planner)

Staff Summary: Staff is requesting review and approval on the proposed project's design theme and conceptual landscape design concepts for Carson City's Freeway Landscape Project. The project's design concepts will enhance the northern freeway's corridor with native/naturalized landscaping, drip irrigation systems, hardscape components, including large boulders, rock talus, visual features, and aesthetic enhancements.

Recommended Board Action: I move to approve the conceptual landscape design and design theme "Carson City's History in Motion" for three interchanges and three grade separations on Phase 1 (northern leg) of the Carson City Freeway.

Explanation for Recommended Board Action: Over the past four months, Carson City, Gardeners Reclaiming Our Waysides (GROW), Nevada Department of Transportation, and Winston and Associates consultant team have developed conceptual native/naturalized landscape and hardscape designs, including aesthetic enhancements for three interchanges and three grade separations on Phase 1 (northern leg) of the Carson City Freeway. The project's design theme "Carson City's History in Motion" was created to guide design decisions and convey the City's history through motion and travel as a central element of the northern freeway. In addition, the freeway's landscape design will adhere to NDOT's U.S. 395 Landscape and Aesthetic Corridor Plan. These landscape and aesthetic improvements are being proposed at the North Carson Street, Arrowhead Drive, and College Parkway interchanges and at the Northgate Lane, Emerson Drive, and Northridge Drive/Carmine Street grade separations.

After an extensive public outreach campaign by City staff, the proposed concepts were presented to the public at an informational meeting held on Tuesday, January 19, 2010, in the Sierra Room and front lobby of the Carson City Community Center (851 East William Street) from 5:30 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. Also, a project overview presentation was provided by City staff and the design consultant team at 6:30 p.m. in the Sierra Room and was broadcast on public access television. The public was given an opportunity at the meeting to ask questions and was encouraged to provide written comments before leaving or submit their comments later in writing to the City. The deadline for project comments was Tuesday, January 26, 2010. Since the public informational meeting, the City's project management team, including representatives from GROW and NDOT, have directed the design consultant team to make changes to the project's design concepts based on verbal and written comments received during the meeting and on the project's construction budget limitations. It will be these modified design concepts City staff will be presenting at the Board of Supervisors meeting.

Applicable Statute, Code, Policy, Rule or Regulation: N/A

Fiscal Impact: The future fiscal impact to the City will consist of on-going landscape maintenance costs. City staff is currently working with the design consultant team to develop these preliminary costs and present them at this meeting.

Explanation of Impact: It is anticipated by City staff the Regional Transportation Commission will be funding the on-going project's landscape maintenance costs through Gas Tax revenues.

Funding Source: Carson City has received approximately \$2.2 million for the proposed improvements to the northern freeway corridor. \$1.7 million was secured through federal funding by the efforts of Senator Harry Reid and GROW. In addition, Carson City received \$500,000 through NDOT's Community Match Program. The design costs for the project are being funded by the Regional Transportation Commission.







Aesthetic look for freeway proposed

Gone are the days when motorists could look forward to nothing more than barren concrete freeway entrances and sound walls while traveling the nation's highways.

Residents will get an opportunity Tuesday night to review and comment on Carson City's History in Motion, a proposed plan to blend landscape, art and history into the six interchanges and grade separations of the north leg of the Carson City Freeway.

The themed idea builds on the Nevada Department of Transportation's vision for the entire Highway 395 corridor, which is intended to celebrate Carson City's history through motion and travel. The project will benefit freeway travelers as well as drivers on surface streets around the freeway.

"This could put a new face on Carson City and give us a new way to look at our city," said Park Planner Vern Krahn.

The meeting, sponsored by Carson City and Gardeners Reclaiming Our Waysides, will be from 5:30-8:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Sierra Room and front lobby of the community center, 851 E. William St.

The public will be encouraged during the first hour to review the exhibits and talk with staff from the city, NDOT, GROW and project consultants, to share their ideas and ask questions.

A formal presentation will be offered in the Sierra Room during the second hour, with the

final hour devoted to more informal conversations, said Krahn.

"We wanted to make it a convenient format so people would have lots of different opportunities to come in at different times," he said. "These are conceptual ideas, and we hope the public will respond positively, but we also hope that they will help us prioritize what's most important and least important as we move forward — what are their favorite elements and what they could live without."

Plans include a combination of steel sculpture cutouts, wooden structures, berms, paintings, boulders and landscaping. Native or drought-tolerant vegetation will be used in the landscaped areas, and all plantings will be drip-irrigated.

Mary Fischer, president of GROW, said the vision for creating aesthetic surroundings for the freeway started in 1997.

"What we have now is so much more than we ever dreamed when we thought about rocks and native vegetation," Fischer said. "We're very, very excited. The designer was so interested in Carson City history and this project has so much history in it. Nobody ever believed this would happen."

Pischer said it is critical that the community attend the Tuesday meeting and offer input.

"We hope an awful lot of people turn out for this," she said, "We've got some neat concepts, and all the comments people make are important to us, good or bad. It's a true community project with so much history in it that it's the kind of thing where tourists could get a map showing all interchanges with the history of our community."

"Without these monies, we wouldn't be doing this," Krahn said. "It was not in the original plans for the freeway. This is a chance to come back and take another run at it."

Looking into the future, Kralm said funding is not yet available for the Highway 50 East Interchange, but plans call for a V&T theme. NDOT has received stimulus money for the Fifth Street Grade Separation and the Fairview Interchange, which will be the next step.

"Think of it as a history book, with each chapter having its own theme within that book," Krahn said.

After the public meeting, the concepts will be refined and a detailed design process will be completed between March and June. Final design is scheduled from July through mid-October, and the project could go to bid in December with work starting in early 2011.



Open House

The first hour of the public forum was conducted as an open house. This allowed the public forum attendees to review presentation boards that illustrated concept plans for each interchange / grade separation in the project area as well as their supporting graphics and illustrations. Meeting attendees also had the opportunity to ask questions and make comments and suggestions to City Staff and the Design Team.

Some of the comments from this portion of the public forum included:

- Use expanded metal for cutouts.
 - Cost Savings
 - Wind Resistance
 - Graffiti Resistance
- Prefer rocks and vegetation over cutouts.
- > Likes deer, eagle, and motor convey.
- > Likes Pony Express concept.
- ➤ Likes Pony Express concept but feels that that concept is more suited to Highway 50, since Highway 50 is closer to the actual route.
- Include Joann Skelly (Cooperative Extension Office) in the plant selection process.

Public Presentation

Introductions

Vern Krahn and Mary Fisher opened the public presentation with introductions of both the Design Team and GROW members present, including Marie, Jan, and Jim Kiley.

Power Point Presentation by the Design Team

Paul Kuhn of Winston Associates presented the following:

- Purpose of Tonight's Meeting
- Freeway Landscape Project History
- Freeway Landscape Project Area
- Progress to Date
- Design Process Status
- Next Stε, 3: Design Refinement
- Freeway Corridor Concept (NDOT's Vision)

- > North Segment Design Charrette
- > Stakeholder Points of Consensus
- Design Parameters

Paul followed this with an explanation of each interchange and grade separation using the color plan views and illustrative graphics.

Participants were encouraged to follow up the meeting by submitting additional questions or comments on the NDOT or Carson City Websites, or to submit their comments to Vern Krahn.

Key Points of the Presentation

- Made it clear that the concept plans *intentionally* showed more improvements than could be constructed within the current budget. The Design Team and Stakeholders (GROW, City Staff, and NDOT Staff) did not want to 'presuppose' the preferred design elements or scope of the landscape enhancements. One of the purposes of this public forum was to solicit comments (both positive and negative) from the public and gather feed back on their priorities.
- Noted that there was strong support for the overall concept for the Freeway Corridor -- which was based on Carson City's history. This aspect of the design was not 'likely' to change, unless major objections were raised by the public or decision-makers.
- Emphasized that the physical environment of the Freeway Corridor— (road maintenance chemicals, high winds, poor soils, slopes, and a need for reduced water usage) created a constraint for intensive landscape plantings.
- Described on-going maintenance costs as a major concern the plans for the Freeway needed to address and could limit the scope of irrigated landscaping within the corridor.
- > Mentioned how the Bike Path is slated to follow the entire corridor.
- > Explained that a theme based on the V&T Railroad was suggested for the Highway 50 interchange
- Explained that an alternate idea for the north side of Northgate/Emerson grade breaks could be to base a theme on the historic Sam Davis Ranch and traveler's use of its watering holes.
- Acknowledged that the concepts included regional interpretations in some cases. For example, while the Comstock boom was not actually based in Carson City, the city served as a gathering place for materials and processing.

Question & Answer Period

1Q: Who is going to be responsible for maintenance and is money set aside?

Paul: A one-year maintenance period is included in the \$2.2 million that has been budgeted for construction.

Vern: RTC Gas Tax Funds will be used to fund subsequent maintenance and would be administered by City staff or contracted out.

2Q: There has been similar work in the Las Vegas area. What has been the experience with graffiti and vandalism?

Lucy: Research and NDOT's experience has shown, that these types of treatments tend to be viewed as an enhancement of the quality of life by the residents in the area and they experience less vandalism and graffiti as a result.

3Q: Just wanted to say that these ideas weave a harmonious tapestry of wildlife, plants and history.

4Q: What might not be included in the final product? Can you tell us?

Paul: The Design Team will work to apply the scope of the final improvements evenhandedly across the north segment and eliminate as few key elements as possible. May cut back on quantity of boulders, or the number/size of talus slope treatments, but the Design Team did not want to make those choices without public input. Let us know if there is something you want us to leave in or take out. The allocation of the budget over the north segment is a general number at this time, which is consistent with the nature of conceptual-level design.

5Q: Comment about the timeline theme? Who is your audience; side streets or highway users? Any thought about the highway side?

Paul: Because of the 12' sound walls along most segments of the highway, it's hard to take the theme to the highway user. No resources have been dedicated to the highway viewer at this point.

Vern: We are sensitive to that idea, but we have an elevated freeway for the North segment, level (at grade) in the middle segment, then a drop below grade, and then back up into the canyon on the south end. A variety of opportunities will eventually be provided, for the highway user, especially in subsequent phases. The multi-use path also gives us a lot of opportunity for exposure.

Paul: Valid comment though. We will look at other options for getting enhancements to extend above the sound walls. It may be able to get imagery on the highway side of the sound wall, but only if these are painted images since the sound walls are also crash barriers.

Mary: We have talked about this and it may be possible to develop a brochure later to explain these nodes along the highway – similar to the Blue Line walk in Carson, where the brochure tells you about historic homes. Brochures about the Freeway could be made available at local lodging or visitor centers.

6Q: Historically, many races/ethnicities were involved in this area (Chinese, Basques, etc.) but it might be too complex if we tried to drag everything into the north segment. There was a Chinese Museum proposed near Mound House about which there was great excitement. During the course of your discussions was there any consideration of Chinese participation? If Chinese businessmen were coming here; would they notice dedications to the Chinese, acknowledging their back breaking contributions?

Paul: We discussed using Chinese miner images at College Parkway. We could include a Chinese laborer in that group. There are opportunities to include Chinese imagery in the Comstock concept, the V&T Railroad theme proposed the Highway 50 interchange, or Fairview Drive.

Other: Good to consider Basque, Chinese inclusion.

Lucy: Ample opportunity to still do that, especially with the Basque and Chinese on other

areas of the freeway.

As always, nice to hear from you !!!

The short answer to your question is:

1) As currently proposed there will be no landscaping at the College Parkway Interchange.

2) We are aware of Tom's concerns regarding the reduction of landscaping throughout the entire project area and in particular, the elimination of landscaping College Parkway Interchange.

The thinking behind this decision is:

1) The College Parkway Interchange is different than the other freeway interchanges or grade separations in the project area and it is difficult site for plant materials for the following reasons:

a) Snow plowing and sanding activities at the interchange will harm or kill most, if not all the plant material in the throw zones. Typically, snow plows move through this interchange quickly tossing snow and sand great distances behind the sidewalk. I was just over there this afternoon and you can see the distribution patterns.

b) The concern underneath the bridge structure is too much shade for the establishment and healthy growth of the plant materials. In addition, shade tolerant plant materials are typically more delicate and the above activities (snow plowing and sanding) could put the City's park maintenance crews into a "no win" scenario by having to replace plants every spring caused by damage snow removal and sanding. As a result, it would increase the City's maintenance costs. The bridge creates a wind tunnel effect under the structure and could lead to plant desiccation (plant water loss / drying out the leaves) by the wind during both the summer and winter months.

c) Under the bridge structure the areas between the concrete slope paving and the sidewalks act as storm water conveyance channels. Once again, I was over there today and there is a lot of standing water in these areas. Could the grades in these areas be re-contoured to drain better ??? Yes, but the plant material in these areas could still get too much water to thrive. (for a plant too much water is just as bad as not enough)

d) Due to traffic safety factors (sight distances and clear zones limitations) in a high speed area, including the above mentioned snow plowing and sanding activities there was very little area to landscape in the traffic islands, specifically for trees. In addition, putting park maintenance workers out in these islands presents safety concerns for the City.

If my above arguments haven't convinced you, Scott and I would be glad to drive out to the interchange, meet you, and walk through it with you..... Of course, Tom is welcome to join us !!!

A small but enthusiastic group turned out Tuesday night at the community center to get a closeup look at plans for landscaping along the north leg of the Carson City Freeway.

History in Motion is a proposed plan to blend landscape, art and history. The themed idea builds on the Nevada Department of Transportation's vision for the entire Highway 395 corridor, and is intended to celebrate Carson City's history through motion and travel.

Becky Mabray said she was excited about the project.

"It has expanded much more than they talked about years ago with just shrubs and things. I like that all the interchanges will have different themes," Mabray said.

"I remember when Mary Fischer of GROW (Gardeners Reclaiming Our Waysides) came over to our neighborhood and talked about plantings and rocks, but telling a little of the history here — I think that's nice," she said.





Goal for the Carson City Freeway Landscape Project: To design and implement landscape and aesthetic enhancements for the three interchanges and three grade separations that make up the north leg of the Carson City Freeway in order to improve the visual experience for residents, motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians and to celebrate Carson City's distinctive history and character.

Design Process: The following steps are envisioned to complete the design process for the Freeway Landscape Project (all time frames shown are approximate).

- Concept Plan Design: Develop the concepts and themes for each of the six areas -- the current phase of work which continues through the end of February, 2010
- **Preliminary Design**: Refine the concepts and begin the detailed design process (March through June, 2010)
- Final Design: Finalize the construction documents for the physical implementation (July through early fall, 2010)
- Bidding and Contractor Selection: Late fall through end of 2010
- Construction: Work to commence late 2010 or early 2011


Funding: Total funding for the project is approximately \$2.2 million and is already in place. Funding is from a combination of Federal funds and the NDOT Community Match Program. The design work has been funded by the Carson City Regional Transportation Commission.

Concept Plans and Themes: The current plans are conceptual and intended to convey the overall approach for each area. The scope, extent, locations, and materials used for the improvements shown will change in response to design refinements, available funding, as well as safety and maintenance concerns.

Design Theme: "Carson City's History in Motion". This idea builds on NDOT's vision for the entire 395 corridor, which will celebrate Carson City's history when complete. Conveying the city's history through motion and travel is a central element of the north segment's theme.

- North Carson Interchange: Eagle Valley Concept. Creates a gateway to the Eagle Valley and Carson City and portrays its character prior to settlement as well as wildlife in motion.
- Arrowhead Drive Interchange: 1919 Transcontinental Motor Convoy Concept.
 Commemorates the US Army's test to drive military vehicles cross-country, which traveled through Carson City. The convoy included a young Dwight Eisenhower and ultimately led to the development of the current interstate highway system.
- Northgate Lane and Emerson Drive Grade Separations: Pony Express Concept. Celebrates the Pony Express' brief but colorful history as well as the Sam Davis Ranch.
- College Parkway Interchange: Comstock Lode Concept. Portrays the equipment and mining
 activities that were an essential part of the silver boom that helped Nevada gain statehood and
 spurred Carson City's growth.
- Carmine / Northridge Grade Separation: Stagecoach Concept. Features the colorful
 characters and events associated with travel by stagecoach, including a race between competing
 stagecoach lines.
















