Staff Summary: A new effort entitled the Regional Shared Federal Framework was initiated by officials in Washoe County to collaboratively present a common vision to improve the quality of life and economic prosperity of the region. Many agencies are already involved in the development of a Shared Federal Framework (SFF) document which will articulate the region's needs and priorities. This action would direct staff to participate in this collaborative effort and provide guidance on the needs and priorities of Carson City which staff will work to have included in the SFF document.

Recommended Board Action: I move to direct staff to participate in the Regional Shared Federal Framework effort and to pursue the inclusion of Carson City-related matters in the Northwestern Nevada Shared Federal Framework document to be presented to the region's congressional delegation.

Explanation for Recommended Board Action: A new regional collaborative effort is underway called the Regional Shared Federal Framework. A group of regional agencies has held several meeting and continues to meet. The Regional Transportation Commission (RTC) of Washoe County is providing the staffing for the group, and has reached-out to Carson City. Lee Gibson, the agency's Executive Director, has discussed the matter with Mayor Crowell and briefed the Board of Supervisor's during public comment at the Board's October 3, 2013, meeting.

The group has developed a draft document entitled the Northwestern Nevada Shared Federal Framework which they intend to share with the regional's congressional delegation, including at a Northwestern Nevada Local Government Summit in Washington D.C. on December 10th. The draft document, which is attached, currently does not contain information regarding the needs and priorities of Carson City, but the group would like to have Carson City's input and continued participation.

Carson City staff has reviewed the draft document and identified opportunities to include additional information. The Board of Supervisors is asked to direct staff to participate in the Regional Shared Federal Framework group in general and to specifically seek the inclusion of the following changes to the draft document:

- Changes to the executive summary indicating Carson City's participation and support.
- Addition of Carson City support for continued funding of the Community Development Block

- Additional information will be provided to complete the information for the Carson City Freeway.
- Addition of Carson City support for reauthorization of national transportation legislation MAP-21.
- New priorities to be added to document:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In an era of unprecedented economic and political change, leaders of the local, regional, state, and not-for-profit agencies in Northwestern Nevada are collaborating with urgency, and a common vision to improve the quality of life and economic prosperity of the region. The combined infrastructure, program, and policy recommendations outlined in this report are critical to building a stronger community. The Shared Federal Framework (SFF) is designed to articulate the federal regulatory, policy, and funding needs and priorities of Northern Nevada.

The initial objectives of the SFF were focused on economic development and infrastructure investments that support short- and long-term job growth. The early champions of the SFF were members of the City of Reno, City of Sparks, and Washoe County.

Economic Development

This recommended package of infrastructure investments supports regional access to jobs and freight & passenger mobility in the western U.S.

Environmental Stewardship

These recommended policies protect water quality in the Lake Tahoe Basin & Truckee River Watershed and protect against wildfires.

Public Safety

These recommended projects protect against catastrophic wildfires and flooding and support emergency responses.

Current SFF participants are predominantly associated with the Washoe County region and the Lake Tahoe Basin. The SFF is a dynamic group and the number of participating entities is expected to grow over time. It is anticipated that additional county and city governments in Northern Nevada will join the SFF discussions as well as members of the private sector. Participation in the SFF is voluntary and no costs will be incurred by participants unless they desire to do so. They work to provide opportunities for individuals in rural communities to work collaboratively toward a regional economic development plan. SET has worked to establish targets for multiple sectors in the region including: business services, energy, mining, agriculture, defense, manufacturing, biomedical, transportation and logistics, arts, entertainment, and recreation.

While there are many project priorities in each of these policy areas, some initiatives are expected to be the subject of legislative action within the next year. These most pressing issues are summarized below.

The initiatives below support the economic health of northwestern Nevada and critical social services. The Marketplace Fairness Act is the top economic priority for local governments in the region and allows for competitiveness with local businesses that must collect taxes. Community Services issues are centered on restoring funding of programs to prior levels. The Medicaid issue pertains to inmate care not being allowed in the Affordable Care Act.

ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENT PRIORITIES

The energy and environment priorities reflect the needs of the entities that are interconnected parts of the Truckee River Basin, ranging from Lake Tahoe through the Truckee Meadows and beyond. These areas share a common river system and regional infrastructure and all will benefit from protecting against invasive special, flooding, and wildfires.

WRDA is funding that will be governed by the USACE and impacts critical flood control projects in the Truckee Meadows. The Lake Tahoe Restoration Act (LTRA) will address many of the critical issues surrounding water issues in the Lake Tahoe Basin and Truckee River Watershed. The Farm Bill allows for certain water and waste water projects as well as funding for rural development.

TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES

Transportation priorities reflect the need to support thriving aviation, including passenger and goods movement, at the Reno-Tahoe International Airport, which is a critical economic generator for northwestern Nevada. In addition, reauthorization and adequate funding for MAP-21 supports the streamlining processes that are important for surface transportation project delivery, funding of critical bus transit facilities, and the roadway and transit projects that ensure regional mobility and public safety.

The City of Reno, the City of Sparks and Washoe County comprise the Washoe County HOME Consortium [WCHC], which receives and administers HOME funds in Reno, Sparks and unincorporated Washoe County. These funds can be utilized for pre-development, development, construction, acquisition, preservation and substantial rehabilitation of affordable, permanent or transitional, housing units. WCHC's primary goal is to help low-income persons obtain affordable housing. WCHC additionally allocates funds for deposit and rental assistance to homeless families who meet certain qualifying criteria, In FY12/13, the WCHC developed and/or rehabilitated approximately 100 rental units that are affordable to households earning no more than 50 percent of the area median income (AMI), as well as provided deposit and rental assistance to approximately 50 renter households. Significantly, in FY12/13, HOME funds expended by the WCHC for completed rental projects leveraged approximately \$18,635,039 in private and state resources.

HOME Consortium and the Low Income Housing Tax Credit have provided much needed development in low and medium income neighborhoods. The recent construction of a 43-unit housing development in the Oddie Boulevard corridor is just one example of this program's success. The affordable housing developments in Sparks are accredited to HOME and the Low Income Housing Tax Credit.

The HOME Consortium is a Housing and Urban Development funded program focused on affordable housing. This program combined with the Low Income Housing Tax Credit has encouraged investments in Sparks' Oddie Boulevard corridor. These programs are currently threatened due to a tax reform proposal set to eliminate "all special provisions in the form of exclusions, deductions, and credits and other preferences" unless they have support from Senators.



Federal Agency/Account: Program Description:	Currently Title XIX of the Social Security Act, which governs the Medicaid Program, prohibits Federal Financial Participation (FFP) for services provided to inmates even if they are eligible and already enrolled in Medicaid. Additionally, because the State of Nevada does not assume the federal share of providing Medicaid services to eligible persons in county custody, inmates lose eligibility which results in the entire cost of inmate's care to fall on the county.		
	A conflict with Medicaid regulations resulted with the passage of the Affordable Care Act (ACA), which requires Qualified Health Plans (QHP) offered through Insurance Exchanges to cover inmates pending disposition of charges which would maintain their coverage. To date, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services have declined to issue revised regulations which would harmonize the definition of "inmate of a public institution" with the ACA. Without this reconciliation of the regulations, inmates enrolled under QHPs would be eligible to receive services from that plan but those who are Medicaid eligible would not be covered. In fact, many in-custody QHP eligible individuals will lose their income and become Medicaid eligible. Clearly the administration of both programs will be much more complicated without changes to the regulations.		
Regional Significance	The Washoe County Sheriff's Office currently has responsibility for operations and funding for incarceration; the Washoe County Department of Social Services coordinates with the WCSO to provide health care assistance to indigent clients with a total budget of over \$20 million annually expended on indigent health care. A change supporting continuation or even suspension of benefits while incarcerated will ensure eligible clients remain within the current health care system and ensure efficiencies for funding at a Federal, State, and County level. At a larger level, benefit qualified jail inmates under the ACA would provide new revenues for counties to provide more comprehensive services, particularly substance abuse treatment Such treatment generally results in measureable savings in the overall cost of health care

For example, preventing new aquatic invasive species from entering Lake Tahoe also protects the Truckee Meadows water treatment and distribution system, while the management of flooding in the Truckee Meadows will protect the airport serving Reno, Sparks, Washoe County, Carson City, Douglas County and Lake Tahoe.

Decisions related to future investments in costly inspection activities would clearly benefit from a better understanding as to whether quagga can survive and reproduce in Lake Tahoe.
Regional Significance of Project/Policy - describe current project status	Recent findings from other western aquatic ecosystems indicate that quagga mussels survival can occur under variable and lower calcium concentrations than previously reported. While Lake Tahoe has been categorized as "low risk" for quagga mussel establishment based solely on its low dissolved calcium, preliminary findings from the pilot study conducted by University of Nevada Reno and Desert Research Institute scientists provide evidence that short-term adult and juvenile quagga survival could be possible in Lake Tahoe. There is an urgent need to develop a complete risk analysis based on early and late stage life histories of quagga and a basic preclictive model for describing the locations of mussels in Lake Tahoe's nearshore and region, Lake managers are seeking information to determine how strict boater inspections and policies need to be to prevent invasion of quagga mussel to the basin. This is of immediate concern and will greatly affect Douglas, Lyon and Mineral Counties in Nevada. Currently, the Bi-State Sage Grouse Draft Environmental Impact statement is in the 90-day comment period whereby interested governments can submit comments. After that, the BLM and Forest Service will review the comments and issue a final EIS and record of decision. Senators Dean Heller and Harry Reid introduced the Douglas County Conservation Act of 2013 (S. 1263), which will assist in creating Sage-Grouse habitat conservation areas. The next step will be for the bill to be introduced in the House of Representatives. The listing of the Greater Sage-Grouse under the Regional Significance of Project: Endangered Species Act would have significant impacts on the economy and major industries throughout Northern Nevada. The FWS will complete their listing decision of the Greater Sage-Grouse by September 2015. Currently, the Bureau of Land Management and the U.S. Forest service are updating their Resource Management Plans to incorporate adequate conservation measures to avoid a potential listing. The BLM is preparing an environmental impact statement (EIS) for the RMP. The final EIS is expected in March 2014. At the local level, we have been actively collaborating with our respective planning groups and state and federal partners by analyzing our local land use development plans. We will continue to work closely with the Nevada Congressional Delegation to identify actions that can be taken to create or enhance Sage-Grouse habitat conservation areas in order to avoid the listing on the Threatened or endangered species list.

Regional Significance	The 2012 Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Reauthorization Act was passed after 22 separate short-term Continuing Resolutions. Such Continuing Resolutions, which impact federal funding, are becoming a common occurrence. These delays make it extremely difficult to efficiently plan construction activities and complete critical airport improvement projects.
	Additionally, sequestration is expected to reoccur in FY 2014. Sequestration includes automatic spending cuts set to begin on a certain date without a federal reauthorization, and previous Sequestration cuts in the form of furloughs have already impacted FAA, Transportation Security Administration (TSA) and Customs & Border Patrol (CBP) staffing levels. Any FAA, TSA or CBP staffing decreases have a direct impact on passenger service, increasing processing times and causing delays. The TSA is currently working under a hiring freeze and limiting overtime expenditures resulting in delays at security checkpoints. A 2014 Sequestration is likely to result in additional air traffic control system disruptions, reduced service levels at flight service and weather observation stations, delays in federal funding allocations, additional delays in CBP processing and TSA checkpoint processing.
	In addition to customer service impacts, Continuing Resolutions and Sequestration will likely result in delayed grants. Delayed grants can push a project from one calendar year to another, requiring re-bidding and risking higher prices. RTAA's winter-related construction shutdown for airfield projects begins at Thanksgiving and runs through April 1.
	Timely approval of an FAA Reauthorization Act is of great benefit to airports nationwide. On an annual basis, the FAA distributes monies to eligible airports in the form of AIP grants for the planning and development of publicuse airports. AIP grant funds are drawn from the Airport and Airway Trust Fund which is supported through a user paid system in which commercial passengers are assessed a fee on a per ticket basis.
	The capital improvements portion (\$3.35 billion) of the AIP has not been

raised in many years and in fact, there is continual pressure to reduce levels. Existing AIP levels are inadequate to properly address national airport system infrastructure needs. Without increases to AIP funding levels or changes to the Passenger Facility Charge (PFC) program, critical airport improvements projects will not be funded.

Additionally due to Sequestration, the FAA was allowed to raid the "Grants-in-Aid for Airports" program (e.g. AIP funding) of \$253 million in 2013 to pay air traffic control tower operational costs, including controller salaries. This is a contradictory use of AIP funds since airports cannot use AIP funding for the day-to-day operations of their facilities. Yet, the FAA was allowed to use AIP funding for exactly that purpose.

The FAA's recent "solution" to staffing cuts has set a disturbing precedence. Although the transfer of AIP funds to the FAA for day-to-day operations was labeled a "one-time" event, upcoming funding issues are great enough to raise the concern that it could happen again. The FAA cut expenditures by \$486 million in FY2013 to meet the requirements of Sequestration, with upcoming FY2014 expenditure reductions expected to be \$697 million. Although the FAA has already identified \$500 million in cuts through overtime, travel, contracts, services, attrition and hiring freezes, the FAA must also account for \$100 million in mandatory pay increases. This leaves a shortfall of \$337 million still to be identified which should not be drawn from the AIP grant program.

The recent uncertainties related to AIP funding (e.g. decreasing authorization levels, delayed funding, transfer of AIP funding to FAA salaries) has increased the importance of the PFC program to airport sponsors. At the Reno-Tahoe International Airport, PFC funds may be used to support FAA-approved airport capital projects that mitigate environmental concerns, enhance safety, security, capacity, or increase air carrier competition. Every commercial airline passenger that departs the Reno-Tahoe International Airport is assessed a PFC of \$4.50. The expenditure of PFC funds, pursuant to federal law, must be approved by the signatory airline carriers of Reno-Tahoe International Airport, the FAA, and the RTAA Board of Trustees.

PFC collections were first authorized in 2000, but capped at \$4.50 per departing passenger. Inflation has eroded the purchasing power of the PFC. When adjusted for inflation, the \$4.50 authorized in 2000 is the equivalent of \$2.45 today. With dwindling reserves and allocations from AIP funding sources (budget cuts and Sequestration), the PFC program's \$4.50 cap needs to be raised and indexed to inflation or uncapped entirely. Unlike AIP funds, PFC funds are generated locally and therefore local communities should have more flexibility in determining their respective PFC cap levels based on their better understanding of local conditions.
