Regular Deputies	\$28 per hour (salary and mileage)
Reserve Deputies	\$20 per hour (salary and mileage)

II. PATROL ACTIVITIES:

- A. Time schedules for patrols will be flexible to allow for emergencies, other priorities, and day-to-day needs of both Cooperator and the U.S. Forest Service. Ample time will be spent in each area to make visitors aware that law enforcement officers are in the vicinity.

The emphasis of the patrols is to discourage and take action on vandalism of government property, lewd and obscene behaviors, illegal camping, illegal campfires, littering, fighting, illegal parking in Forest Service Parking lots, underage drinking, drug use and other applicable Nevada State laws. Behaviors of concern in the area are: sex and sexual activities in public, sexual assaults, people walking naked on trails, fighting, underage drinking, drug use, illegal camping and campfires, and vandalism.

- B. Patrol Areas: Lake Tahoe National Forest beaches, forests, and parking areas including but not limited to:



- Chimney Beach parking area, trail to beach, and Chimney beaches, forest surrounding beaches and trail and shoreline area connecting to Secret Harbor/ Secret Cove parking lot trails.
 - Secret Harbor/Secret Cove Parking area, trail and road system leaving parking lot, all beaches and rocky shoreline accessed by parking lot. Emphasis in patrols and presence in the Secret Cove area and forest surrounding cove.
1. Cooperator will provide foot and vehicle patrols at National Forest beaches, forests, and parking areas.
 - a. Patrols are to be made in a marked Sheriff's vehicle as well as on foot during the day and after dark. The assigned Deputies will possess a radio capable of operating on Forest Service frequencies or other jointly available frequencies and will maintain communications with the Forest Service LEOs.
 - b. For each Patrol Shift, the assigned personnel will complete and turn in an Officer's Daily Field Activity Report (FS 5300-26). These logs shall accompany the request for reimbursement.
 2. Cooperator will provide special boat patrols along National Forest shorelines and beaches to detect, enforce, and report violations of laws and regulations as they pertain to resource and property protection and public and employee safety.
 - a. Patrols are to be made in a marked Sheriff's vessel as well as on foot during the day and after dark. The assigned Deputies will possess a radio capable of operating on Forest Service frequencies or other jointly available frequencies and will maintain communications with the Forest Service LEOs.
 - b. For each Patrol Shift, the assigned personnel will complete and turn in an Officer's Daily Field Activity Report (FS 5300-26). These logs shall accompany the request for reimbursement.
 3. Cooperator will go in and out of service via radio or telephone with Camino Emergency Command Center 530.642.5170 and notify the Center of all known injury/fatality incidents that occur on National Forest System lands as soon as possible.

Funding is allocated as follows:

Total allocation for Patrol Activities shall not exceed:\$8,000.00

III. EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES:

The Forest Service will loan those surplus items that will further the cooperative effort. These items are property, but in most cases will be expendable. The items will be tracked and accounted for by the Patrol Captain.



The Cooperator will account for and track these items, and will return them to the Forest Service when no longer needed and will report the damage or destruction of such property when applicable or no longer serviceable.

If the equipment is abused or neglected, as determined by the Forest Service, the Cooperator may be billed for the repairs or replacement of the equipment.

IV. SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT SITUATIONS:

- A. Special Enforcement Situations include but are not limited to: Fire Emergencies, Drug Enforcement, and certain Group Gatherings.
- B. Funds available for special enforcement situations vary greatly from year to year and must be specifically requested and approved prior to any reimbursement being authorized. Requests for funds should be made to the U.S. Forest Service designated representative listed in Item I-A of this Annual Operating Plan. The designated representative will then notify the Cooperator whether funds will be authorized for reimbursement. If funds are authorized, the parties will then jointly prepare a revised Annual Operating Plan.
 - 1. Drug Enforcement: This will be handled on a case by case basis. The request will normally come from the patrol Captain; however, it may come from the Special Agent in Charge or their designated representative. Reimbursement shall be made at the rates specified in Section I-B. Deputies assigned to the incident will coordinate all of their activities with the designated officer in charge of the incident.
 - 2. Fire Emergency: During emergency fire suppression situations and upon request by the Forest Service pursuant to an incident resource order, the Cooperator agrees to provide special services beyond those provided under Section II-A, within the Cooperator's resource capabilities, for the enforcement of State and local laws related to the protection of persons and their property. The Cooperator will be compensated at the rate specified in Section I-B; the Forest Service will specify times and schedules. Upon concurrence of the local patrol Captain or their designated representative, an official from the Incident Management Team managing the incident, Cooperator personnel assigned to an incident where meals are provided will be entitled to such meals.
 - 3. Group Gatherings: This includes but is not limited to situations which are normally unanticipated or which typically include very short notices, large group gatherings such as rock concerts, demonstrations, and organization rendezvous. Upon authorization by a Forest Service representative listed in Section I-A for requested services of this nature, reimbursement shall be made at the rates
