






























Storm Reaction Efforts

- * Emergency Response Team:
 - * Consisted of over 26 PW employees
 - * 4 Command staff with 22 crewmen from Streets, Water, Sewer and Landfill divisions
- * All of PW's equipment was used for recovery
 - * Landfill was temporarily closed to utilize their equipment

Storm Clean-up

- * Cost
 - * July 20th Storm estimated \$125,000
 - * August 11th Storm estimated \$350,000
- * Operations Staff
 - Most PW crew members continue to assist in recovery efforts, as well as regular duties and operations
 - Hired contractors to assist with recovery to get it done in a timely manner
- * Schedule for Complete Recovery
 - * Minimum of 2 months remaining
 - * 70% complete-July 20th storm recovery
 - * 50% complete- August 11th storm recovery

Federal Assistance Program

- * FEMA Public Assistance Program
 - * Must meet eligibility requirements
 - * Must have a local disaster declaration
 - * Must have a state disaster declaration
 - * Will pay 75% of eligible costs remaining 25% is the responsibility of the state/local government

* The applicant must be eligible * The facility must be eligible * The work must be eligible * The cost must be eligible Applicant

Financial Threshold Criteria

- * State must meet minimum threshold of damage estimates or actual expenditures
- * Local government must meet minimum threshold of damage estimates or actual expenditures
- * Based upon a single event
- * Federal Fiscal year thresholds:
 - * State = \$3,753,710 (\$1.39 per capita)
 - * Carson City = \$193,459 (\$3.50 per capita)

State Assistance Program


- * State Disaster Relief Account
 - * Must have a local disaster declaration
 - * Must meet financial eligibility requirements
 - * Must be approved by State Interim Finance Committee
 - * Will pay 50% of eligible expenses
 - * Comes in the form of a grant or a loan, based upon local government request and need

Financial Need

- * Difficult burden to meet the financial need
 - * ...the Interim Finance Committee (of the State of Nevada) must make a determination that the local government is currently unable to meet its financial obligations......when considering ending fund balance, balances in capital accounts, and general government accounts.....


Possible Future Storm Trends¹

- * Summer storms have been guesstimated for "moderate" increase of intensity of rain, and in the number of events exceeding some threshold
 - * "Moderate" meaning an approximate 10-20% increase
 - * Dr. Kelly Redmond, DRI Regional Climatologist



Storm Water Funding History


- * Storm Water Fund created in 2003
- * To provide for capital projects / maintenance, as well as fund FEMA / NPDES Phase II programs.
- * Lower end of maintenance was selected by Board of Supervisors from 3 options (Low / Mid / High funding levels).



Capital Projects / Field Operations * Fiscal Year 2013-2014 Capital Projects * Timberline Sediment Control Project \$76,000 * WNC Storm Improvements & Vicee Basin \$225,000 * Kings Canyon Channel Maintenance Project \$50,000 * Lakeview Storm Drain Upgrades \$250,000 * W. Washington Pipe Improvements \$125,000 * Operations / Engineering Staff * 4 FTE staff under storm funding * 2 crew members - street sweeping * 2 engineering / administrative * Other division support as needed

- * To Better Manage Storms:
 - * Private/Public Partnerships
 - * Inspection, Maintenance, and Reaction
 - * Capital Projects
 - * Awareness
