Staff Summary: The Office of Criminal Justice Assistance administers grant funds to state and local units of government for a wide variety of programs to improve the criminal justice system. This grant provides funding for two days of statewide training in High in Plain Sight. The Carson City Sheriff's Office provided this training (using another grant from the same agency) in December, 2014 and has been asked to provide it again. The information to be presented covers the rapid changes that are occurring in the drug world including e-cigarettes, vaping pens, use of these mechanisms to use marijuana, powdered alcohol, K-2 Spice, Synthetic Bath Salts, changes in clothing, stash spots, new laws and the effects on law enforcement, youth brains, and behaviors. This training is highly recommended for law enforcement, school personnel and community leaders. The grant period is 10/01/15-12/30/15.

### CRITICAL NEED: Describe the training needs that you are seeking to address.

The drug culture is not the same and it continues to change – rapidly. E-cigarettes, hookah pens, vaping pens, marijuana – medical or recreational use, extracting a concentrated form of THC from the plant (dabbing) and powdered alcohol (also known as "Palcohol") are only a few concerns that are leading to changes in the world of substance abuse. Public safety officials need to be aware of the changes and signs to look for such as clothing, new "stash places"; music and ways drug users have for signaling others. Law enforcement, fire departments, schools, community coalitions, and health care professionals need training regarding these rapid changes. Marijuana dispensaries are changing communities.

Additionally, Nevada laws are changing regarding marijuana – for medical use, allowing dispensaries, and soon to be expected - recreational use. It is critical to train as many law enforcement, public safety, school personnel and health care professionals in Nevada as soon as possible. The extraction of THC from marijuana plants involves techniques that can be explosive and cause fires. There was a reported incident in Sparks, Nevada of a fire that started when an individual was attempting to extract THC from marijuana plants. Issues other communities are encountering due to dispensaries are already hitting Nevada. There are other similar fires that have broken out in the surrounding area that are suspected to have been started as a result of similar circumstances.

Carson City Sheriff's Office and the Nevada DARE Officer Association offered "High In Plain Sight" training in December, 2014. The training was so full that approximately 15 people were unable to attend because there was simply no room. Carson City Sheriff's Office has received several requests to host another such training because the information in this workshop is so new and relevant.

And, the drug culture continues to change as evidenced by the numerous reports coming out that show marijuana dispensaries are changing communities – and not always for the good. Articles are coming out almost daily such as:

February 9, 2015 - "Drunk Driving Wanes in U.S., Drug Use by Drivers Report Says (Reuters) February 23, 2015 - "Holland's New Marijuana Laws are Changing Old Amsterdam" (MSN) March 12, 2015 - "Powdered Alcohol Approved by Federal Agency" (Fox News)

Other articles indicate that a host of social issues are rising including homelessness, youth substance abuse, drug related DUI arrests, binge drinking, alcohol poisoning, impact on the brain, and other health issues are on the rise.

People are closely following Colorado. In the 2014 "Legalization of Marijuana in Colorado The Impact report indicates that Cannabis related fatal motor vehicle accidents has more than doubled from 2006 to 2012. The same report indicates that Colorado school districts have increases of cannabis related student suspensions have increased, increase in homelessness, and a host of other social issues have increased since the passage of laws allowing for medical and recreational use of marijuana, the opening of dispensaries, and the overall commercialization of marijuana.

According to the 2014 Monitoring the Future survey, E-cigarette use among students in 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade has increased. "Specifically, 30-day prevalence of e-cigarette use was 8.7%, 16.2% and 17.1% in 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade. The corresponding prevalence for tobacco cigarette use was 4.0%, 7.2% and 13.6%. Note that in 8<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grades e-cigarete prevalence is more than twice the prevalence of regular cigarettes," (Monitoring the Future National Survey Results, pg. 44). The state of Washington has THC packs that can be used in e-cigarettes and/or vaping pens.

One cannot stress the importance of training law enforcement, public safety and other community members in Nevada of the "new drug culture."

Officer Galloway has worked several different assignments, including: crime scene investigation (CSI), DUI task force, officer mentoring, and as a field training officer. After playing Division I basketball, Jermaine received his BA from the University of San Francisco. Jermaine is currently an adjunct instructor at NNU (Northwest Nazarene University).

Jermaine has coordinated and led thousands of alcohol related initiatives. Jermaine is also an Idaho POST certified instructor in alcohol beverage laws, drug identification, community policing and hate & bias crimes. He currently provides nationwide training to police officers, prevention personnel, educators, counselors, parents, treatment providers, health professionals and community coalition members on alcohol and drug trends, drug identifiers, drug clothing, party patrols, party drugs, Fake ID's, drug concealment, alcohol and energy drinks, drug logos, synthetic drugs, drug concentrates, non-traditional ways of alcohol consumption, cough medicine abuse, alcohol laws, drug stash compartments, popular culture music, and other community based alcohol and drug initiatives.

Jermaine has had articles published in American Police Beat Magazine and many local area newspapers where he has done presentations. Jermaine has also been highlighted in videos and television news media.

### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

### HIGH IN PLAIN SIGHT

# (You Can't Stop What You Don't Know Program)

This workshop is for educators, prevention providers, coalition members, law enforcement, probation officers, school administration, treatment, counselors, and parents. This training will be 6 hours and will cover a variety of topics. This

workshop covers alcohol and drug clothing, alcoholic energy drinks, alcopops, alcohol and drug concealment methods and containers, drug paraphernalia, drug related music and groups, logos, stickers, new technology, youth party tendencies, party games, non-traditional alcoholic beverages, social networking sites, synthetic drugs, OTC drugs, inhalants, concentrates, E-cigarettes, and popular party drugs. This session can also cover common stash compartments that can be used to hide weapons inside everyday clothing containers and other items, along with the relationship between alcohol, drug and violence tendencies. This session is unique, in that it provides over 120 visual aids for attendees to hold and become familiar with. In today's culture everything is person-specific and has different meanings to different individuals. Meanwhile, certain items have gained popularity in the alcohol and drug scene - which changes every day. Officer Galloway tailors this session to each community that he teaches in, and constantly updates this training to keep up with the current trends. Once in your community, Officer Galloway conducts a community scan spending time walking through many of your local malls, convenience stores and retail stores, identifying popular culture alcohol and other items that promote drug abuse. This allows the community to know what is going on nationally and locally in their own retail stores. For each person to help prevent youth and adult substance abuse, you MUST know what is going on in your community.

# The New Drug Trend of "Dabbing" and the Use of E-Cigarettes in the Drug World:

This part of the class will cover the new and emerging drug trend of marijuana concentrates, waxes, and oils. The new trend is sweeping the country and is quickly becoming the primary drug for many drug users of all ages. The session will break down the terms, new paraphernalia that is used (including ecigarettes), logos, what it looks like, odors associated with this drug, potency and much more.

### The Truth About Underage Drinking:

Participants will test your knowledge of the current underage drinking culture. This multifaceted session will cover underage drinking trends, popular youth based drinks, new non-traditional ways of alcohol consumption, alcohol accessibility including fake ID's and adult providers, and new youth based alcoholic items on the market. Also discussed, will be current identifiers, logos, terms, technology, stickers and clothing that are consistent with youth alcohol consumption and drug use. Many of these items can be seen on vehicles and clothing during everyday traffic stops and can assist you in identifying youth who are consuming alcohol or identifying themselves with alcohol use/abuse. Finally, this session will provide attendees with over 40 visual aids along with various examples from across the United States.

## Electronic Dance Music Trends & Effects

In this part of the class, participants will learn about EDM (Electronic Dance Music) which is a growing type of themed music that is popular all over the

world. This session will help those understand the sweeping popularity of the EDM culture and how this is different than other trends we have seen. Discussed will be the various types of events, locations, terms, logos, culture, along with the possible drug and alcohol associations and some of the drug related overdoses at some of these events from across the country. Also, discussed will be the possible community impact of these events on various different sectors along with how to pro-actively educate your community on these events.

<u>Making the Connection between Youth, Drugs, Alcohol, and Violence</u>
This session will make the connection between drugs, alcohol and violence in

Inis session will make the connection between drugs, alcohol and violence in popular youth culture today. The session will show everyday items, including music, logos, technology and identifiers and the true meaning behind many of the products. There are many everyday items that contain hidden compartments or have street level violence meanings. Also discussed will be the dangers associated with certain drugs and high potency alcoholic drinks and their relationship within the youth underage drinking and drug culture.

Prevention through Collaboration:

This workshop focuses on how to prevent underage drinking and youth drug usage through pro-active programs and collaborations between coalition members, prevention providers, law enforcement and educators. Many rural and urban communities run into substance abuse problems among their youth, and are looking for ways to collaborate with others to attack these problems. This presentation will teach participants how to work with others to prevent and then enforce underage drinking and drug usage. Attendees will also learn 'what is out there' in relation to popular drugs and youth alcohol tendencies. Also covered are other partnerships that can be created through community based programs to reduce underage drinking & drug usage.

# <u>Drugged Driving: Physical, Visual and Verbal Identifiers for the Possible</u> Drugged Driver

Logos, stickers, physical identifiers, and clothing may be utilized by the drugged driver. Do you know what that sticker on the car really means? What is that logo on that hat really telling you? Where did they get it? How is it possibly drug-related? Certain everyday items have gained popularity in the drug world and that list is frequently changing.

Underage Parties! Alcohol and Drug Abuse: A Street Level Approach:

This workshop will focus on the observations of Officer Galloway. Attendees will learn current alcohol and drug trends and practices of minors in rural and urban communities. Also, participants will learn how youth are concealing drugs and alcohol at school and the problems facing parents, educators, and law enforcement regarding alcoholic energy drinks. Popular clothing, flasks, and identifiers will be shown to the attendees. The workshop concludes with

community based programs that will help to reduce underage drinking and drug usage in communities.

# Working with Law Enforcement: The Bridge of Collaboration

This part of the course is solution based and teaches educators, community members, and coalitions the methods of working with law enforcement in their community. Includes pro-active approaches to gain leverage with your local police department or sheriff's office. Stresses the importance of working together.

### Identifying the Possible Impaired Driver/Individual

This section of the class will cover the emerging trends of the drug world and the impaired individual. Items discussed will include drug logos, stickers, and identifiers drug clothing, drug concealment methods and containers, and drug paraphernalia. Attendees will see examples of the promotion of impaired driving along with how popular culture music can be associated with the impaired driver/individual. This presentation can also cover alcoholic energy drinks, new flavored drinks on the market, alcohol based clothing, and other non-traditional ways of alcohol consumption.

### **INSTRUCTOR:**

Officer Jermaine Galloway – only instructor

At 6 feet 9 inches tall, Officer Jermaine Galloway looks like an intimidating presence, but he is devoted and passionate about education, training, and enforcement when it comes to alcohol and drug use and abuse prevention. Officer Galloway is a nationally and internationally recognized instructor and is well known for his countless hours of research on alcohol and drug trends.

Officer Jermaine Galloway has been an Idaho law enforcement officer since 1997 and has more than 11 years' experience in underage drinking, drug and alcohol enforcement. Officer Galloway has worked several different assignments, including: crime scene investigation (CSI), DUI task force, officer mentoring, and as a field training officer. After playing Division I basketball, Jermaine received his BA from the University of San Francisco. Jermaine is currently an adjunct instructor at NNU (Northwest Nazarene University).

Jermaine has coordinated and led thousands of alcohol related initiatives. Jermaine is also an Idaho POST certified instructor in alcohol beverage laws, drug identification, community policing and hate & bias crimes. He currently provides nationwide training to police officers, prevention personnel, educators, counselors, parents, treatment providers, health professionals and community coalition members on alcohol and drug trends, drug identifiers, drug clothing, party patrols, party drugs, Fake ID's, drug concealment, alcohol and energy drinks, drug logos, synthetic drugs, drug concentrates,

non-traditional ways of alcohol consumption, cough medicine abuse, alcohol laws, drug stash compartments, popular culture music, and other community based alcohol and drug initiatives.

Officer Galloway also spends much of his time speaking to youth on the harms of underage drinking, drug abuse and tobacco. Each year Jermaine has spent countless hours talking to youth at school assembly's and town hall meetings. Currently, Galloway has trained over 50,000 people nationwide and internationally.

Several years ago, Jermaine and his wife created the Northwest Alcohol Conference. This is a nationally recognized conference, which provides training and enforcement strategies to attendees on community alcohol problems. Jermaine has also created several community based alcohol and drug prevention programs.

Jermaine has had articles published in American Police Beat Magazine and many local area newspapers where he has done presentations. Jermaine has also been highlighted in videos and television news media.

Officer Galloway is also a member of the National Liquor Law Enforcement Association (NLLEA) and several local community substance abuse prevention coalitions. In addition, Galloway has provided keynote and breakout session presentations at several state, nationally and internationally recognized conferences including the International Chiefs of Police Drug Recognition Expert Conference (DRE), OJJDP Underage Drinking Conference, Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America Conference (CADCA), TIPS Conference, National Rural Institute Conference, Drugs and Driving Conference (Ontario Canada), Texas Underage Drinking Youth Task Force, Utah Troubled Youth Conference, Youth Crime Watch of America Conference, Wisconsin, Alabama & Washington SRO Conferences, Utah Juvenile Judges Conference, Several State Highway Safety Summits, SLC Utah School District, International DARE Conference, Idaho Narcotics Officers Association Conference, Virginia School Safety Conference, Washington State, Nevada, Colorado and Idaho School Counselor Conference, National School Safety Conference, Ottawa Canada Law Enforcement, Mississippi School State Prevention Conference, Washington & Idaho State Prevention Summit, Utah State Gang Conference, Idaho School Administrators Conference, and the Texas School Administrators Safety Conference to name a few. Officer Galloway also provides hundreds community, school, organization based trainings along with youth assemblies and community night presentations.

For his efforts in regards to drug prevention and underage drinking in 2009, Jermaine received the National Law Enforcement Partner of the year award from (OJJDP) Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

In 2010, Jermaine received the National Mickey Sadaoff Underage Drinking Award from the director of (MADD) Mothers Against Drunk Driving (see below).
