Staff Summary: This grant funding, if received, will be used to update the Carson City Hazard Mitigation Plan from 2021 to 2026. This plan is required by FEMA based on the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000. FEMA's hazard mitigation plan requirement is a condition for receiving certain types of non-emergency disaster assistance, including funding for disaster relief mitigation projects. The total cost to update the Carson City Hazard Mitigation Plan is estimated at \$115,000. This grant will cover 75% of the cost at

\$86,250 and Carson City would need to cover a 25% match of \$28,750.

Previous Action

The Board approved the previous grant from FEMA through the State of Nevada, Department of Public Safety - Division of Emergency Management, which provided \$106,015 of the \$141,353 total cost (\$35,338 in matching funds, or 25% of the total cost, provided by the City) to the Carson City Fire Department to update the Carson City Hazard Mitigation Plan in 2016.

Background/Issues & Analysis

The Hazard Mitigation Plan development and update is done in an attempt to reduce loss of life and property by lessening the impact of disasters. It is most effective when implemented under a comprehensive, long-term mitigation plan that is continuously updated. This plan, in essence, is to help Carson City engage in hazard mitigation planning by identifying risk and vulnerabilities associated with natural disasters, and developing long-term strategies for protecting people and property from future hazard events. This mitigation plan is key to breaking the cycle of disaster damage, reconstruction, and repeated damage. The development and subsequent 5 year updates to this Hazard Mitigation Plan enables Carson City to:

- •Increase education and awareness around threats, hazards, and vulnerabilities;
- •Build partnerships for risk reduction involving government, organizations, businesses, and the public;
- Identify long-term, broadly-supported strategies for risk reduction;
- Align risk reduction with other state, tribal, and community objectives;

- •Identify implementation approaches that focus resources on the greatest risks and vulnerabilities; and
- •Communicate priorities to potential sources of funding.

The Carson City Hazard Mitigation Plan was first adopted in 2005 and updated in 2011 and 2016. This current grant will allow Carson City Fire to update the Hazard Mitigation Plan from 2021 to 2026.

Explanation of Fiscal Impact: Of the \$115,000 Grant, \$28,750 (25% match) will be match due from the City, and the vast majority of the match will be "in-kind," meaning salaries and benefits of City staff working on the Hazard Mitigation Plan. The City will not need to pay any remaining match until the end of the Grant, so staff will look at this again during the preparation of the FY21 budget and build a small transfer amount from the general fund to the grant fund in the event that in-kind is not enough to cover the match. If it is not needed, this amount will not be transferred and will stay in the General Fund.

Alternatives

- 1. Choose not to update the plan, which would restrict any future FEMA disaster funding relief available to Carson City.
- 2. Pay the full price of \$115,000 to update the Hazard Mitigation Plan without grant funding.
- 3. Provide alternative direction to staff.

The mitigation plan will cover the Carson City/Carson County political jurisdiction. Carson City is a consolidated city/county and is the Capital for the State of Nevada.

If a plan update, describe the evaluation process of the existing plan for its strengths, weaknesses and utility:

The evaluation process for our current plan was built into the plan itself. Carson City holds an annual meeting of the Hazard Mitigation Planning Team. This is a public meeting, properly noticed and held in accordance with the State's Open Meeting Law. The planning team reviews each of the components of the existing Mitigation Plan to determine if the component has been effective and to document what activities have occurred relative to that individual component. Challenges and successes are noted so that those may be incorporated into the plan update.

Describe the process for implementing this planning activity, including the following plan development requirements: 1) participation of agencies, stakeholders and the public; 2) hazard identification and risk/vulnerability assessment; 3) mitigation strategy; 4) plan adoption; and 5) plan maintenance:

The Carson City Hazard Mitigation Planning Team holds annual meetings to measure the success of the existing plan. The planning team is made up of members from multiple disciplines within Carson City and includes representatives from Federal, State, and Tribal government entities who have been participating with Carson City on monitoring of the existing plan. These same groups will continue the planning process during the plan update phase. The update will include a risk analysis and assessment using newer data and including more GIS data and mapping. For all hazards, local mitigation strategies will be updated and more detailed information will be included in the new plan based upon the input received during the annual meetings help to evaluate the existing plan. The planning team will create hazard subcommittees for each of the identified hazards. These groups will perform a detailed review of the pertinent information and will provide updated information and suggest changes to the planning team as a whole. The sub-committees will be made up of subject matter experts who will provide hazard information, as well as mitigation strategies for their given hazard. During the contract period, the vendor will document and address all comments made from the planning team and the subcommittees. The vendor will assemble each section after it is reviewed by the entire planning team and assemble the whole document for final draft review. Public input is critical to this process. Carson City plans to continue our past practice of distributing and collecting a hazard mitigation questionnaire through our month utility bill. This process has yielded a 25-30% return in the past. The survey will be in addition to a community education meeting. The adoption of the plan will take place after final draft review and a presentation to our governing body. The governing body will review the document in a public meeting and provide comments and input before submitted to FEMA for approval. Once FEMA approves the plan, the governing body will formally adopt the plan. The plan will be maintained in the same manner as our current plan. The planning team will remain in place and will conduct an annual review of the mitigation actions, strategies, and gaps and will documents successes and challenges encountered.

What are the primary sources of information and data and how it will be incorporated into existing

planning mechanisms?

Data sources are varied and will include information from the NOAA, the Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology, the University of Nevada Reno, and the Desert Research Institute. Fire history will be obtained from Federal, State, and Local firefighting agencies. Hazardous materials information will come from our own records and the Nevada State Fire Marshal s hazardous materials database. Flood information will come from the Carson City Flood Plain Manager and his staff along with data gathered from NOAA and the federal/state Water Master. Data on health related hazards will be compiled from the State of Nevada Health and Human Services, Carson City Health and Human Services, and the Centers for Disease Control. Local law enforcement, as well as the State of Nevada Fusion Centers will be relied upon to provide current assessment of threats related to terrorism, civil unrest and related hazards. Other sources include; national, regional, and local subject matter experts. Local news sources, historical society, and the library and archives. The data will be integrated through stakeholder planning meetings, vetted, and then incorporated into the plan. The existing plan will also be referenced as a way to obtain additional information.

What staff and resources will be used to implement this planning activity?

The funds allocated will be used to hire a vendor/contractor to work under the direction of the Carson City Office of Emergency Management (OEM). The OEM will provide direction to the vendor, who will coordinate meetings and provide deadlines for planning team members and sub-committee members to work on their assigned projects. Carson City will continue to coordinate with GIS resources.
