Hello Board of Supervisors and Ms. Nancy Paulson,

Thank you for the information on American Rescue Plan Funds yesterday.

We have come through a year and a half of Covid experience and yet it is difficult to get real information on prevention methods such as improving your natural immune system to reduce the ravages of Covid.

I would like to suggest wellness awareness clinics for residents using the America rescue plan funds. This is out of the box thinking but I expect the residents will benefit enormously. For example, testing for vitamin D levels such as the clinic in Carson Valley (photo attached) or in my case by Medicare. The goal should be to raise 25 (OH)D concentrations above 40-60 ng/mL (100-150 nmol/L). In addition, we can take this opportunity to raise the nutrition knowledge and exercise for the overall health in this community.

This is the single most valuable use of the American Use Funds and fits the eligibility requirements of this program. I spoke to Stephanie yesterday at the meeting. I have spoken to the CEO of Carson Tahoe, Alan Garret about the wellness education clinics and he thinks it is a great idea. So there can be partnerships with area hospitals.

I am attaching an article and a photo of the clinic in Carson Valley and an article on Vitamin D w.r.t Covid.

My name is Dave Whitefield. I am a resident of Carson City, and a Commissioner on the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission. The following comments address Item 4b of the Staff Report dated August 5, 2021, regarding the Plan of Expenditure for American Rescue Plan funds granted to Carson City by the U.S. Department of Treasury.

Item 4 is "*Investments in improving outdoor spaces*" and Item 4b is a suggested allocation of \$500,000 for new pickleball courts at Mills Park. I am in favor of this item for many reasons.

My wife, Juana Beguelin, and I led an effort to convert two of the old tennis courts at Mills Park into eight dedicated pickleball courts. This project was completed in September 2020 at a cost of approximately \$16,000. The funds were raised by players in Carson City and the surrounding areas, and were held and disbursed by the Foundation for Carson City Parks and Recreation (FCCPR). Our group has continued to raise funds for the ongoing maintenance and improvement of the facility. The actual work was performed by a team of 25 to 30 volunteers. We also benefited from a labor donation from Finest Fence to install net post sleeves, and the great support of the Carson City Parks and Recreation Department. The group patched holes and cracks in the old surface, completely coated both tennis courts (over 14,000 square feet) with a special pickleball surface material, layed out and striped the court lines and installed the permanent nets. Our group continues to maintain and improve the facility, with the support and cooperation of the Parks and Recreation Department.

Pickleball is one of the fastest growing sports in the country. It is a game that is easily taught, and can be quickly learned and enjoyed by people of all ages. We are fortunate to have a fantastic indoor facility (the MAC) for play during the winter season and the hotter parts of the summer. However, prior to converting the tennis courts at Mills Park, there were no permanent outdoor pickleball facilities in our area. Many other cities around the country have discovered the advantages of building these types of facilities, for the health benefits of their citizens, and the economic benefits to their communities. The idea behind our project was to demonstrate the demand for a permanent outdoor pickleball facility in Carson City, in hopes of encouraging the City to invest in a newer, more robust facility. A facility with a minimum of 12 courts would be capable of supporting not only the local player contingent, but also enabling regional tournament events capable of drawing substantial tourist dollars to Carson City. The demonstration project has succeeded well beyond our dreams. A typical day finds between 20 and 40 players enjoying the courts (capacity is 32 players simultaneously). Play typically occurs in the mornings and again later in the day toward evening. Players come from the local area (Carson City, Dayton, Fallon, Reno/Sparks, Minden/Gardnerville, Lake) and from around the country. I field between 8 and 20 calls per week from visitors to Carson City wanting to play at the courts. The demand for this type of facility has been clearly demonstrated.

I am writing to voice my strong support for the allocation of funds from the American Rescue

Plan as outlined in Item 4a of the previously mentioned Staff Report. I believe the new pickleball facility would provide great physical and mental health benefits, as well as economic benefits to our community. With the Mills Park Master Plan Revision currently underway, we have an opportunity to add a component that would make Carson City a "pickleball destination" city, bringing in tourists from around the country. I urge the Board to support this proposal.

My name is Sunny and I am a brain cancer survivor. At the age of 47, I presented in the hospital with a tumor the size of an egg that had obliterated my frontal lobe and pineal gland. I am lucky to be alive. I have had a full resection craniotomy and have had two full treatments of Cyberknife Focused Radiation. I also have COPD and digestive issues. Catching Covid could be a death sentence for me, with my weakened health. This is why I'm sending written comments, instead of appearing in person at the Board meeting. Thank you for this option.

According to my professional medical team, the reason I am able to survive this chronic disease, and the reason the tumor's growth is still inhibited after treatment, is directly related to my Cannabis consumption. It saves my life every single day. I could argue the benefits of this miracle plant that is provided to us by our Mother Earth for HOURS, but I will limit my comments to the issue at hand; curbside Cannabis pickup.

Since the beginning of the Covid lockdown, I've been blessed with the ability to safely purchase my Cannabis medication from inside my vehicle, at the curb DIRECTLY IN FRONT of the dispensary. This has been NO LESS THAN a life-saving interaction for me. Simply entering the dispensary and perhaps touching a surface or breathing someone else's air, could have infected & killed me.

Dear Mayor and Supervisors:

I write in regard to item 12.E on the August 5, 2021 meeting agenda, which concerns the introduction of an ordinance prohibiting the curbside pickup of cannabis products. I wish to express my support of the prohibition.

The proposed ordinance more closely resembles a public safety measure than a business regulation. Beginning with the 2016 murder of Grant Watkins in Carson City, there have been no less than three robberies in our immediate area connected with the sale of marijuana to the occupants of a vehicle. In all three of these incidents, gunfire was exchanged. Two young men were murdered during the perpetration of these crimes. These are the incidents that we know of. It is virtually certain that other similar incidents went unreported to law enforcement for obvious reasons.

These incidents are indicative of the lengths to which some individuals will go to illegally acquire cannabis. Underaged individuals who cannot legally acquire cannabis products from a licensed establishment pose a particular danger in this regard. Of course, none of these incidents involved a licensed cannabis establishment. But that proves the point. The two retail establishments licensed by Carson City have gone to extraordinary lengths to implement safety measures to deter the illegal acquisition of cannabis products and keep their employees safe as legal transactions are processed. These measures have worked. To date, my office is not aware of a single criminal incident involving either of Carson City's two licensed establishments.

Public safety was this Board's primary concern when it considered whether to license retail cannabis establishments in Carson City. The two establishments that were ultimately licensed assuaged that concern with assurances of safety measures and protocols designed to minimize the risk to the community's safety. Curbside delivery was never part of that equation. The COVID pandemic created a different kind of public safety hazard, prompting the State to make the curious decision to unilaterally permit curbside delivery of cannabis products statewide in April, 2020. SB 168 corrected this course, authorizing local governments to decide the curbside delivery issue for themselves.

No doubt, opponents of the proposed measure will point to the period of time when Nevada has allowed curbside delivery as proof that it can be accomplished without compromising the public's safety. That is certainly fair evidence for the Board to ponder. But so is this: it only takes one tragic event to turn curbside delivery from a calculated risk to a foolish gamble. The fact that such a tragedy has yet to occur offers little comfort.

The licensed retail establishments have been able to conduct their business safely in large part because they are able to completely control the environment in which cannabis transactions occur. Cannabis products are secured. Employees are in areas that are physically inaccessible by consumers. Surveillance cameras capture and record transactions. A curbside exchange cedes almost total control over the transaction environment to the consumer. For legitimate consumers, the result is convenience. But for the criminal masquerading as a legitimate consumer, the result is a much easier opportunity.

The St. Teresa of Avila Conference, St. Vincent de Paul Society has been providing tenant-based rental assistance in Carson City for over 10 years. We want to thank you for awarding our all-volunteer organization multiple CSSG annual funds to support our Homelessness Prevention project. We have received \$11,750 and \$18,000 in previous years, and we currently have \$20,000 in CSSG funding for Homelessness Prevention. The St. Vincent de Paul Society coordinates our efforts with those of Carson City Human Services (CCHS) and Nevada Rural Housing Authority (NVRHA) to minimize duplication of services. We focus our efforts and limited funds on individuals and families that need \$300 or less of one-time rent assistance, while CCHS and NVRHA handle the more complex and difficult tenant-based rental assistance situations.

Attached are two annual summary reports highlighting how your CSSG funds have been spent to assist Carson City residents. Our collaboration with you provided tenant-based rental assistance to 57 households (169 adults and children) from July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020. During the period of July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021, financial support was given to 57 households (135 adults and children). As a result, over the most recent 24 months, our CSSG Homelessness Prevention projects have delivered 9120 safe and secure nights for Carson City residents facing possible eviction from their primary residences. The cost and investment for one person (adult or child) to prevent homelessness by stopping eviction proceedings for one month is ONLY \$3.26 per night. This year, we will be assisting senior citizens, disabled citizens and families with children with our current \$20,000 CSSG funds.

We look forward to another successful Homelessness Prevention Project throughout this Fiscal Year and for additional years into the through your continued CSSG funding.

Mayor:

Thank you for meeting with me and Sierra Well staff on August 3, 2021.

We appreciated your observation of Sierra Well curbside operations. As we discussed, curbside delivery continues to make sense in light of the resurging pandemic in order to reduce contact between guests and employees. Many customers appreciate the convenience of curbside service, which is a more efficient method that diminishes parking impacts, foot traffic, and queuing outside our store. Sierra Well currently conducts as much as 40% of our business through curbside service, where each order may be prepared in advance with transactions completed in a fraction of the time compared to conventional, in-store orders. Sierra Well employees carry cash and product for curbside deliveries under the oversight of a security officer, which relieves customers of the necessity of carrying cash or product between the store and their vehicles. This enhanced efficiency lessens congestion and queuing outside the stores. The staff report associated with the proposed ordinance accurately notes that eliminating curbside would have a negative economic impact to our business, as well as tax revenues to the city.

Finally, please note Sierra Well conducted a petition regarding curbside delivery from July 30th to August 3rd asking participants if they wanted to keep curbside services in Carson City. Over 400 petition participants indicated their desire to keep curbside delivery for a variety of reasons. Many customers value curbside to accommodate their disabilities, physical limitations, and safety.

Regardless of the Board's action with regard to the ordinance under consideration, Sierra Well will immediately implement the following specific changes, which are consistent with the code changes as proposed by Silver State Government Relations via separate letters:

- Eliminate advertising, logos, and signage from shade structures used by security and guests outside
- Eliminate the Curbside designations for parking spaces adjacent to Highway 50 and retain curbside parking designations only on the spaces immediately in front of the dispensary
- Omit logos and advertising from the curbside parking signs
- Diminish the total signed and designated curbside spaces from 8 to 5
- Establish screening to limit the visibility of curbside operations from Highway 50
- Continue to voluntarily and proactively consult with your office, and concerned agencies, regarding operations

Conceptual Amendment to Ordinance No. 2021
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AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO CANNABIS; PROHIBITING CURBSIDE PICKUP OF CANNABIS; AND PROVIDING OTHER MATTERS PROPERLY RELATING THERETO.

Will Adler, Principal, Silver State Government Relations on behalf of Sierra Wellness and Rise

Amend Section 1 of the proposed ordinance to restrict those cannabis retail sales known as 'curbside' in these ways:

- Curbside operations shall not extend past the store frontage in which the facility operates;
- All exterior signs related to the Curbside program must be discrete and solely for the
 purpose of indicating curbside pickup spots. No additional signage promoting Curbside
 services shall be permitted outside the dispensary facilities.
